13:15-14:40 Teaching Excellence Award Recipients’ Workshop: Turning Moral Distress into Moral Resilience

Presented by Emma Beckman (UQ) and Donna Drynan (UBC), winners of the 2016 U21 Health Sciences Teaching Excellence Award
What is Moral Distress? What kind of impact does it have at the organisational and personal level? Why do we need “Gritty” health practitioners and how do we develop them? This workshop will explore the concept of moral distress and moral resilience and focus on key strategies for developing medical and allied health practitioners that can respond with awareness to times of moral distress throughout their careers. The workshop will present some activities for understanding the key concepts behind moral resilience but will also focus on what educators can do to teach these skills in students during their tertiary studies. With increasing levels of student numbers and higher rates of student anxiety at tertiary institutions, the workshop will also consider the concept of moral distress in the academic environment and discuss potential strategies for building moral resilience in early and mid-career academics.

Workshop 1: Curriculum on gender-based violence**FADA Auditorium**

Gender Based Violence (GBV) is the term used to capture violence that occurs as the result of unequal power relationships between the two genders. It covers a range of issues, such as Intimate Partner Violence (IPV), Female Genital Mutilation, human trafficking and sexual abuse. It is a global issue, affecting women and girls across the world. Students from a range of health disciplines are often under-prepared within their curricula and do not have sufficient coverage of the issue to equip them with the required knowledge and confidence to deal with GBV. U21HSG have funded a study to design an interactive, interdisciplinary learning resource for students. It will be incorporated into different undergraduate/graduate programs such as medicine, nursing, public health, pharmacy, dentistry across U21 universities. The study runs from September 2017-September 2018 and involves collaboration between Universities of: Auckland, Birmingham, British Columbia, Glasgow, Nottingham and Melbourne. In this lively workshop we will engage with U21 colleagues from as many health disciplines as possible to inform the development of the resource. We will ask participants: What are the different learning needs of students across U21 regions? What are the content, design and discipline-specific requirements of the GBV resource that we need to consider? How can language and cultural issues be overcome in design and delivery of the GBV resource? Our resource is going to be invaluable for all our students so please come and join us to help us get it right!

Workshop 2: Curricular experiences in caring for disadvantaged populations, in particular those with mental health conditions**Protea Auditorium**

In order to fulfil their mandate toward social accountability, health professional programs provide their students with education experiences in caring for disadvantaged populations, in particular those with mental health conditions. In this workshop, participants will: define the learning objectives for these experiences; share examples of what they are currently offering; discuss challenges in implementing this type of experience; and identify opportunities within their own programs for future curriculum in this area.

Workshop 3: Collaborating on Global Health in the U21 Health Sciences Group**Conference Room 2**

The purpose of this session is to explore potential new collaborative projects in research and education in the area of global health that are likely to be successful and produce outputs. Part one will be an introduction which sets the scene for collaboration, including a definition of what we mean by 'Global Health' in this context. Then there will be breakout groups where participants will be asked to identify areas in global health where collaboration would make sense in the U21 HSG. When identifying such projects we will consider: 1) The manpower requirements and the importance of the problem 2) What outputs the collaboration could generate? 3) How we will measure the impact of the collaboration? 4) Identify those projects that are linked to solving health problems that are of high priority both within and outside our network 5) Identify areas where we may achieve quick results that could lead onto future funding. At the end of the session we hope to have identified 1 or 2 potential new projects that the U21 HSG could work on.
